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The cross – source of blessing

Dear members of the Marian Blessing Circle!

The source of blessing is, of course, first and foremost Jesus Christ. His whole life as a man is a blessing for us. God becomes man: that is astonishing. When God comes to man, the Creator to the creature, it can only bring blessing. How good our God is! He always bestows blessings and graces! As a child in Bethlehem and Nazareth, in His public work, when He works miracles or blesses the sick, when He proclaims His Gospel. His suffering and death in particular are a source of blessing. His death redeems us from all sins and opens heaven to us. He gives people salvation and blessing. His death is linked to the cross. For He died on the cross, that mark of shame of the Romans. He suffered the death of the cross like a criminal. And yet, dying, He still gave forgiveness to the thief. "Today you will be with me in paradise." (Luke 23:43) "In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins" (Ephesians 1:7).

Because Jesus died on the cross, the cross has become a symbol of redemption through Christ. And it is the (!)

hallmark of Christians. We hang crosses in homes and public buildings, around our necks or on rosaries, on the top of towers or mountain peaks. A culture of remembrance! The cross is a sign of Jesus' sacrifice on the cross, a sign of victory for the Risen Christ.

Catholic Christians in particular have the custom of the crucifix. Crucifix means: pinned to the cross. By this we mean Jesus nailed to the cross. So our crosses are usually not just the two beams joined together, but crosses with the martyred and nailed Jesus.

My communion cross shows Jesus nailed to the cross. His heart is open. The soldier has opened the side of Jesus. Blood and water flowed out. For the soldier, this was proof that Jesus was dead. The open and overflowing heart of the Crucified One has become a source of blessing for us. "From within him will flow rivers of living water."(John 7:38)

It shows a woman standing beneath the Crucified Christ. She is holding up a chalice. Blood and water flow from Jesus' heart wound into this chalice. The woman is not Mary, but the Ecclesia, the Church, i.e. us. The sacrificial love of Christ, his immense blessing, flows into our hearts. And may we not experience this mystery, suspecting and believing, every time we receive Holy Communion? His blessing, His grace, indeed He Himself, the blessing par excellence, comes to me, to us.

The prayer of the day for the Feast of the Sacred Heart summarizes this well: "Almighty God, we venerate the heart of Your beloved Son and praise the great deeds of His love. Grant that we may receive the fullness of grace and life from this source of divine mercy. Amen."

Jesus is the source of all blessing. The cross is a powerful symbol of this source. When we make the sign of the cross, we look to the source and receive His blessing.

May Almighty God, the + Father and the + Son and the + Holy Spirit, through the intercession of Mary, Mother of God, bless you!
